Use a Strong Closing Your closing should be strong, and include examples of organizations that are similar to yours that are currently benefiting from the kind of grant you're requesting. When you sign the letter, reiterate your relationship to the organization. If you have a notable standing in the community or organization, be sure to make a note of that title along with your signature. For example, some students need them from teachers, and employees may request them from teachers to help them advance from one phase of life to another.
